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
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VET and English-language education account for a growing share of international enrolments

VET & ELICOS students are drawn from many countries, reducing idiosyncratic country risk


Enrolled international students (thousands), 2022




The biggest benefits from international education come from getting the best students to stay




Share of skilled and family permanent streams by first visa held

The biggest benefits from international education come from GRATIAN getting the best students to stay permanently



Share of permanent skilled visa-holders, by student visa history, and primary applicant status



Half of all former VET students who secured PR did so via employer sponsorship




Shares of permanent primary skilled visa-holders in Australia, by highest level of Australian study and permanent visa stream

Former VET students earn much less than other skilled migrants & roughly the same as local VET graduates





Median earnings, by field of highest study, and student visa history, 2021




Reasons given by international students for coming to Australia, % citing reason as important, 2022

The government is acting to manage student visa integrity risks amid concerns over the pace of migration

Changes introduced in 2023 in response to Nixon Review:

- Restricting concurrent Confirmations of Enrolments until a student has completed at least 6 months of their course.
- Increasing the amount of savings international students must have to get a student visa to \$24,505.
- Additional scrutiny on high-risk student cohorts.
- Possible use of powers to issue suspension certificates to high-risk education providers.¹
- Strengthening the existing 'fit and proper provider' test to be registered as an education provider.
- Prohibiting agent commissions on student transfers between providers in Australia.
- Giving greater access to agent performance data such as student completion rates and visa rejection rates to education providers.
- More funding for ASQA (the national VET regulator).

Additional changes announced in the government's Migration Strategy:

- Higher minimum English language requirements (from IELTS (or equivalent) 5.5 to 6.0).
- Replacing the 'Genuine Temporary Entrant' test with a new 'Genuine Student' test (and using this new test to restrict onshore visa hopping by international students)
- Prioritising student visa applications for lower risk providers.
- Bolstering the student visa integrity unit in the Department of Home Affairs (and more collaborating with ASQA).

Canada is a reminder that more dramatic migration policy changes are possible...



Cap on new student visa applications

- Canada will cap new international student visa applications "to stabilize new growth" for a period of two years.
- For 2024, the cap is expected to result in approximately 360,000 approved study permits, a decrease of 35% from 2023
- Those pursuing master's and doctoral degrees, and elementary and secondary education are not included in the cap.

Limit post-study work rights for many VET-level courses

- From September 2024, international students who begin a study program that is part of a curriculum licensing arrangement will no longer be eligible for a postgraduation work permit upon graduation.
- Under curriculum licensing agreements, students physically attend a private college that has been licensed to deliver the curriculum of an associated public college.
- These programs have seen significant growth in attracting international students in recent years.
